### **Message From the Minister**

Samuel and I got to take a break away in County Cavan a few weeks ago. We stayed just outside a tiny town called Belturbet. There were lovely forest walks, great bird watching opportunities and the much needed hairdresser appointment for me. I fell in love with this small town and did some research on its history.



To my surprise I found out that John Wesley passed through this historically important if small town in 1760. It played a significant part in ancient

Irish battles in the Anglo-Norman wars. Likewise during the time of the Plantation of Ulster and

consequently in the early Irish rebellion (or rather the struggle for independence). They even gave Cromwell a run for his money. The Church of Ireland building, which stands on the highest part, is one of the oldest on the island.

The town was drawn into the recent troubles when two people were killed in a loyalist car bomb in

1972. The present population is just over 1,200 souls. Yet for a place so small you can walk through from end to end in 20 minutes (but only if you have the heart to ignore the beautiful Turbet island that sits in the Erne river), it has a long reach.

What made me smile though was what John Wesley wrote about his visit to Belturbet,

"a town in which there is neither Papist nor Presbyterian; but, to supply that defect there are, Sabbath breakers, drunkards, and common swearers in abundance"

### Dear Knitting and crochet groups,

I am a Neonatal Nurse Specialist in Crumlin Children's Hospital looking for your help. Can you help by knitting bonding squares for the sick babies in hospital? Bonding squares are two Identical roughly 5 x 5-inch squares, knitted or crocheted in any colour, pattern or wool.

It is important that there are no holes in the pattern or embellishments. The identical pair is divided: one given to the mother and one given to the baby and then swapped to help with

bonding and give mum's scent to the baby as a comfort measure.

When the knitting/ crochet groups meet back could you please help create a campaign to knit for Crumlin Children's Hospital? You can place each pair in small sandwich bags and post them to myself, the details are at the bottom of this email. I have attached more information on the bonding squares and below you will see a link to a variety of patterns that can be used to create them.

# Names of different parts of the CHURCH

Have you been confused when people at church talk about the Vestry, the Naïve or the Transept?

Here is your guide.

Below is what we see if we fly over the Church in a helicopter – Clontarf Road (R807) runs along the bottom of the picture and Howth Road (R105) runs diagonally with Marino Crescent Park just visible.



The section bounded by yellow is the Church grounds and the section bounded by orange is Howth Road national School. It is a pity the triangle is complete – or else it may become part of the conspiracy plot in the next Dan Browne bestselling novel



Now focussing on the Church grounds lets us change the direction we are looking from (Howth Road) to get a better view, zoom in and clearly define four areas:

The garden;


The Church;

The Scots Hall; and


The link between the Scots Hall and the Church building.




The Scots Hall layout is shown below.



And finally the Church layout – now you can see which bits have those strange names



The transept – Usually a church is built with a transept on both side of the sanctuary as shown below and you notice that this forms a cross. Apparently this was the original intention bit it cost too much for both, so as good Presbyterians we only build one. This is fortuitous as we were then able to fit the Scots Hall in. There is disagreement over the origin of the transept. It may have developed Christian Basilican churches, such as the original St. Peter's, Rome. Or it may have developed from the cruciform plan of tombs in the time of the Roman emperor Constantine. Actual transepts first appear in Romanesque churches.



The Vestry is a room in a church were the vestments are kept, and in which the clergy and choir don these liturgical clothes for worship services. Valuable or sacred items such as communion vessels or collection plates may be kept there, usually in a secure safe, along with official records such as registers of marriages and burials. We have moved away from wearing fancy clothes for services (other than a minister's

collar) and our choir does not robe up. We decided to use our vestry as part of the link into the Scots Hall and store the
