

RTÉ harvest thanksgiving service

1.11.2020 | Moderator, Ministry, Farming and Rural Life, Harvest

Earlier this morning, in a recorded sermon on the RTÉ News channel, Presbyterian Moderator, Rt Rev Dr David Bruce, brought a special message for this harvest time. He was joined by Presbyterians from Counties Antrim, Dublin and Galway.

While the Moderator has temporarily paused his online Sunday services for now, in a special broadcast for harvest, Dr Bruce reflects on Psalm 67. In this morning's service, Dr Bruce said, "It might not feel as if God is blessing us just now — especially since congregations right across the State are prevented from meeting together in Church. But I want to say that even though times are complicated and hard, God is still blessing us."

Produced for RTÉ by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI), with contributions from PCI ministers and members, Dr Bruce takes us through Psalm 67, which opens with a blessing in the first of its seven verses, 'May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face shine on us...' and closes with 'The land yields its harvest; God, our God, blesses us. May God bless us still, so that all the ends of the earth will fear him.'

The Moderator talks about what knowing God's ways and his salvation looks like in the world today and is joined by one of his chaplains for his year in office, Rev Helen Freeburn,

Minister of Galway United Presbyterian and Methodist Church. Also taking part in the service is Rev Richard Houston, Minister of Lucan Presbyterian Church, along with two farming members of Kilbride Presbyterian Church in County Antrim. The father and son, reflect on their own harvest, now that it is safely gathered in.

The Moderator was recorded in the Weir Chapel in Belfast's Assembly Buildings.

In October's newsletter we placed a request from Mary Keogh, with her request for knitting bonding squares for the sick babies in hospital. The contact details were missing.

Ideal pattern see below: which have no embellishments or holes; Identical squares, roughly 5 x 5-inch squares, knitted or crocheted in any colour, pattern or wool. The identical pair is divided: one given to the mother and one given to the baby and then swapped to help with bonding and give mum's scent to the baby as a comfort measure.

Carrot Cake / Loaf

I have calculated that I have made this cake at least 30 times every year for the last ten years. For every cricket tea, church fete or Ministers meeting I roll this one out, so much so that I have memorised the list and quantity of the ingredients and have a large cake tin that is used exclusively for this recipe.

The original recipe comes from an Avoca Café Cookbook but over the years I have added and subtracted and played with it to make it easy. What I really like is that you get a large cake or two loaves and you do not need butter. If you just want one loaf, half the ingredients – it has never failed – I have made cupcakes from this recipe. I do not use any topping as that just adds a load of sugar and the taste of the cake itself is what we are after.

Prepare:

Line one large cake tin or two loaf tins with baking parchment.

Get the oven onto 180 o C or gas mark 3.

Into one bowl go all the dry ingredients which are mixed together:

400g sugar – sifted to get rid of lumps (plain old granulated white works)

400g self-raising flour – sifted

- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 or 2 teaspoon(s) ground ginger
- 0.5 teaspoon ground nutmeg (careful here as to make is overpowering)
- 1 teaspoon salt

Into a second bowl go all the wet ingredients which are mixed together:

4 eggs

400 ml sunflower oil (never olive oil – the flavour is too strong)

400g grated carrot

Mix the contents of both bowls together – I use a hand mixer.

Into the cake tin or split equally between 2 loaf tins

Into the oven for 60 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.

Leave to cool for 15 minutes before turning the tin(s) out.


